EDGE NIGHT GOAL

The goal of this Edge Night is to help middle school youth better understand the Creed — specifically why we pray it, and where it comes from. The Creed is the summary of our Faith as passed on from Jesus to the Church that is professed by Catholics worldwide as a sign of our faithfulness and trust in God.

EDGE NIGHT AT A GLANCE

This Edge Night will help the youth understand the Creed and the implications of professing the Creed. The Gather opens the night with small groups creating a Constitution or Creed for their small groups that they plan on following for the semester. The Proclaim expounds upon what a creed is and what we say when we profess the Creed, including what is meant by our "Amen." The Break introduces the youth to the Nicene Creed and gives them an opportunity to discuss different elements of the creed and the importance of it to their life. The Break also challenges the youth to live out what they profess to believe in the creed. The night ends with a Send including a Litany of Saints: 20th Century Martyrs and a profession of the Nicene Creed.



ENVIRONMENT

Set up the main gathering space with patriotic colors that represent your country, put up your country's flag and decorate with your country's colors. If possible you can also have the Core Team and youth minister wear sports jerseys of their favorite teams.

CORE TEAM FORMATION

The Creed is the summary of our Faith and is professed by Catholics around the world. In it are all the treasures of what we believe It is important that when we recite the Creed that we do not just rattle it off by memory, but that we say each word with intention and purpose. This entire semester is going to break down each part of the Creed so it is important that, as a Core Team, we are familiar with it. Take some time this week to pray with both the Nicene Creed and Apostle's Creed and look up in the Catechism any particular topic that you do no understand. Here are some questions to reflect on this week:

- Do you understand what you are saying when you profess the Creed? Are there any beliefs you struggle with?
- What lines stand out to you in the Creed?
- What can we do this semester to help our youth understand the importance of the Creed and all the teachings it contains?

TO THE PARENTS

This week at Edge, we talked about the Creed. It is the summary of our Faith as passed on to the apostles from Christ. The basic structure of the Creed follows the Trinity, professing the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. We also talked about the value of our "Amen" as an expression of belief and the importance of living that belief in everyday life. Here are some points to generate discussion with your son or daughter:

- Why do we pray the Creed, and why is it important that we have one?
- Why do you think it is important to live out what you believe?
- Share with your son or daughter why you had them baptized.

GATHER

WELCOME AND INTRODUCTION

(5 min)

As the youth enter the room, have your national anthem playing in the background. Have the youth minister gather the youth together, introduce any youth who are there for the first time, and recognize any birthdays. Give a brief introduction to the night and begin with a prayer.

OUR PROMISES

(20 min)

Supplies:

- Butcher paper
- Markers

Break the youth into their small groups, and give them a large sheet of paper and markers. Give them time to write up their own guidelines for their small groups. Instruct them to write up rules for their small groups to live by and a set of expectations for them to live out this semester. Encourage the youth to be as creative as possible and even decorate the whole sheet of paper; at the end have each member sign it.



PROCLAIM

"WHAT IS THE CREED?" TEACHING

(10 min)

This teaching can be found on pages 14 to 15. Here are the main points of the teaching:

- The Creed is the summation of what the Catholic Church believes as passed on to the apostles from Christ.
- Catholics worldwide profess the Creed, which identifies God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
- "Amen" means "I believe."

BREAK

I BELIEVE IN WHAT?

(10 min)

Supplies:

- Nicene Creed handout page 16
- Scissors
- Construction paper
- Glue or tape

Break the youth into their small groups. Use the Nicene Creed handout on page 16 and challenge the youth to unscramble the Creed by cutting and pasting the parts in the correct order on a piece of construction paper. Have a prize for the small group that does this the fastest. If you need more time you can also challenge youth to individually recite the Creed, or try to put it together backwards.

SMALL GROUP DISCUSSIONS

(15 min)

Keep the youth in their small groups, begin with a prayer, and discuss the following questions:

 What was something that stuck out for you from tonight's talk?

- Why do we have a Creed? Why do we pray the Creed? Where does it come from?
- Who do we profess in the Creed?
- Pick out the lines that talk about each person in the Trinity.
- As a baptized Christian, how can we live out the Creed with our "Amen"? Is it a priority in our daily life to live out the Creed? What can we do to make it more of a priority?
- What part of the Creed do you best understand?
 What part of the Creed could you understand better?

TAKING IT DEEPER: SMALL GROUP ADAPTATIONS FOR 8TH GRADE

For the 8th graders, skip the "I Believe in What?" activity and spend some time in deeper discussion, using the small group questions above or supplementing with the following questions:

- Do you know people who say one thing and act differently? Why is this not a good thing? How does it make you feel when your friends do this?
- Do you live what you say you believe? Why or why not? How do you live it out?
- Why is the Nicene Creed important to your faith? How can it help you grow?
- How important is your Catholic faith to you?
- Why is it important to stand up for your faith? How do you stand up for your faith?
- Do you think that it will be harder to stand up for your faith and live it out in high school? Why or why not?



SEND

CLOSING PRAYER

(15 min)

Supplies:

• Litany handout page 17

Gather in large group with the closing prayer. Review the evening's points, with an emphasis on the seriousness of professing the Creed and "signing their name" with an "Amen." Lead the students in a Litany of Saints. Close with a recitation of the Nicene Creed.

FURTHER ADAPTATION IDEAS

- The small group activity of unscrambling the Nicene Creed can be converted to a game within a large group or small group of youth. If you have a large group of youth, the students can compete as small groups. If you have a small group of youth, divide into pairs.
- Take time during small group to share the story of a saint form the Litany of Saints, and have the youth from each small group share the story with the large group.

WHAT IS THE CRED?

TEACHING

KEY WORD DEFINITIONS

Creed - From Latin *Credo* meaning "I believe"; summary of the Faith, professing God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Amen - Comes from a Hebrew word meaning, "believe"; expresses solidity, trustworthiness, and faithfulness.

Martyr - Someone who is killed for standing up for their faith and what they believe.

CONSTITUTIONS

Think of a club you may have formed or a sports team that you are a part of. When starting a club, you probably came up with an idea that you all had in common, and with your sports team there are rules that you all have to follow in order to play the game properly. For many groups, clubs, and sports we sign something to show that we are committed and will follow the mission and rules of that organization. (Share an example of a childhood club.)

The **Creed** is the summary of our whole Faith. Having a fixed formula for the Faith allows Catholics worldwide, to profess the same Faith as passed on by Jesus. The Creed gives us a set of beliefs that build the foundation of the Faith Christ passed on to the apostles. Before Jesus ascended into heaven, leaving the apostles to continue His mission on earth through the Church, He gave the apostles a mission. (Ask one of the youth to read Matthew 28:19- 21.)

THE CREED

The Creed comes from this command to baptize we heard about in the Gospel of Matthew. The profession of faith is necessary for baptism. When you were baptized, you or your parents made this profession of faith in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

The Creed is divided into three parts. The first part refers to God the Father and His wonderful work of creation. The second part refers to God the Son, His divinity and His work of redemption. The third part of the Creed speaks of God the Holy Spirit, His origin and His relationship with the Father and the Son.

CCC 194 CCC 195 There are two Creeds that you are probably familiar with (ask the students the names of the Creeds before giving the answer): the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed. The Apostles' Creed was written as the summary of the apostles' faith in the early Church. The Nicene Creed was written later on in response to some confusion about what the Church teaches. It is longer and includes more details.

AMEN

YouCat 165

At the end of your small group Constitutions, each of your group members signed their name as a sign that they will follow what was written. Each time we profess the Creed, we sign our names to it with our "Amen."

Key Word

"Amen" comes from a Hebrew root meaning "believe." It is an expression of faith, steadfastness, reliability, and fidelity. When we say "Amen" at the end of the Creed, we are saying that we trust in the God who we profess and will be faithful to Him.

When it comes time to profess the Creed at Mass, some of us my space out or mumble the words out of habit. It is easy to take the Creed for granted. However, the Creed is not just a sequence of lines that we rattle off at Mass, but they are the truths that we live for and many have died for.

Key Word

In the early Church, being Christian was illegal. Professing the faith and being baptized into God's family most certainly meant **martyrdom** and death. (Give an example of an early church martyr like St. Stephen or Sts Perpetua and Felicity.)

The Creed is the summary of our Faith as presented by Christ to His Church. Catholics around the world profess their faith in the Triune God — Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. As His disciples, we are called to proudly profess this faith in word and deed with a steadfast and firm "Amen."



NICENE CREED

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through Him all things were made.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the Giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, Who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, Who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.
